As I reflect back on my younger days of church life it just seems that Easter kind of showed up one Sunday. That is, there wasn't much in the way of preparation. Unlike Christmas, which was proceeded by Advent, Easter seemed to have no introduction. Easter Sunday simply came and we celebrated the resurrection.

As I grew older, matured in my faith, and found myself involved in different congregations, I came to appreciate so much more the season of Lent in the life of the church. The forty days leading up to Easter offered me the opportunity to reflect on Jesus' journey to the cross, his suffering, and his commitment to living out God's will. Each day of the 40 day journey allowed me to consider God's own call in my life, my own cross, and what God was asking of me to sacrifice in Jesus' name.

The season of Lent begins this month on Ash Wednesday, February 22. On this evening we will gather in the sanctuary to begin our journey together to the cross of Christ and ultimately to the empty tomb. Along the way we will have the opportunity in our Sundays of worship to consider what this journey to the cross looks like in our own lives. Our worship will be designed in such a way that the motif of journey is always before us. As we make this journey, God's Spirit is then able to work in our lives and prepare us for the resurrection that will follow on Easter Sunday. We will not rush to Easter, but in prayerful movement we will come closer and closer to Good Friday's cross and Easter's empty tomb.

Clint's Corner

In the prologue to his book *A Rumor of War*, Philip Caputo writes, “The marines in our brigade were not innately cruel, but on landing at Danang they learned rather quickly that Vietnam was not a place where a man could expect much mercy if, say, he was taken prisoner. And men who do not expect to receive mercy eventually lose their inclination to grant it.”



The word “mercy” is correctly used synonymously for “compassion” and generally means to have pity for someone. Mercy is an emotion triggered by the afflictions of another, and this emotion binds the two parties together. At the same time there is a difference between the two parties, one granting mercy and the other serving as recipient. This difference is at the heart of God’s mercy toward humanity, for we, being ungodly ourselves, may only serve as recipients of divine mercy. Even so, we are charged with the task of emulating this divine mercy toward others.


“Mercy,” says Henry Blackaby, “is a gift. It is undeserved.” It is unearned. We do not work overtime each week so we might receive a portion of mercy in addition to our salary. Mercy is freely given, or it is freely withheld. In the parable of the unforgiving servant Jesus says, “Then his lord summoned him and said to him, ‘You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?’” God has reached out to us with merciful hands, and God expects us to do the same.

We have come to expect mercy from God. Over the years of our Christian pilgrimage we have been educated in the fine art of repentance and forgiveness, even to the point where these important biblical truths have been reduced to mere rote. It may be that we do not possess a full comprehension of the mercy God has extended to us. We commit terrible offenses against one another, but can any of these compare with our offenses against God. Without mercy our hearts become callused, mere steps away from the hardened hearts of the Pharaohs.

“And men who do not expect to receive mercy eventually lose their inclination to grant it,” writes Caputo. He is writing here, not about God’s mercy toward humankind, but our mercy toward one another. How can we, those of us who have experienced the mercy of God, fail to extend compassion to one another? I’m not exactly sure how we fail, why we fail, or when we fail, but we do; not always, but often enough. Can fulfilling our call to share the kingdom of God’s love with all people ever be achieved without the element of mercy? If the world cannot expect to receive mercy from those who call themselves children of God, from whom can it be expected?

We would like to thank all of our church family for the prayers, calls, visits, and other acts of kindness shown to my family during the loss of a mother and grandmother, Elsie Mitchell. It is times like this when the support of your church family gets you through the difficult times.




