

As some of you know, one of my favorite television shows of recent years is The West Wing. My fondness for the show has led me to view each episode more than once, and these multiple viewings has made it easy to reference the activities of this fictitious White House in conversation and writing. Such is the case for this month's edition of Clint's Corner.

If you also happen to be a fan of The West Wing, you know that President Bartlet is not one to dwell on any given topic longer than necessary. Once an issue has been covered, the president wants to move on, often prompting this move forward by asking, "What's next?"

Churches are not perfect places, and it is at least this one thing that we have in common with the federal government. As an imperfect institution, the church is guilty of several things, among them being the choice to maintain the status quo instead of asking, "What's next?" and moving on. Churches are people, and people like comfort, and comfort is often found in the status quo. When an outsider enters the church and inquires about why something is done a certain way, our firm grasp on the status quo is heard in the response, "I don't know. That's just the way we've always done it." In fact, it seems likely to me that among all the dead churches in the world, it is these words that are carved into their tomb stone: THAT'S THE WAY WE'VE ALWAYS DONE IT.

God is forever moving forward in the world, whether we are or not. Asking, "What's next?" is not about fulfilling our own agendas, but yielding to God's agenda. Moving on to what's next requires courage and humility, a sense of hope, and a faith that is ready to move mountains. But staying where we are, maintaining the status quo, means distancing ourselves from God's activity in the world. Let us not lose sight of what God is doing in the world. Let us move onward behind God's pillar of cloud by day, and pillar of fire by night. And in faith let us always be asking God, "What's next?"
