Metaphorically speaking, sometimes it feels as though life has knocked the wind out of us. Some event or happening brings a sudden impact to our lives leaving us struggling to catch our breath. Maybe it is an illness, a job loss, a family crisis, or an unexpected death. Nevertheless, the blow leaves us down and depleted. Likewise, we wonder if we will be able to get through the difficult experience.

As a people of faith we are not immune from having the wind knocked out of us. Jesus never guaranteed that as a believer we would never face difficulties in our lives. Christians too can sometimes be struggling to breathe. While God does not promise a pain free life, God does promise his presence. When it feels as though we cannot catch our breath, God's Spirit is able to fill the void. And when God enters into our pain we are reminded that we will catch our breath again. The prophet Isaiah said is rightly,

*God gives power to the faint and strengthens the powerless.  
Those who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall  
mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary,  
they shall walk and not faint.*

If you are struggling right now, remember that you are not alone. God is a faithful presence that will not forsake us. Allow God to renew and restore you in the breath of his Holy Spirit.

## MIDDLE OF THE ROAD

It is well known that a nominee to the Supreme Court of the United States cannot become a justice sitting on the highest court of our land without confirmation by the United States Senate. As such, and if for no other reason, it can be said that our Supreme Court does not stand without some degree of political influence. There is also an idea, although it may not be one hundred percent accurate, that says that because of the confirmation process there are no longer any appointees to the Court that are either widely liberal or conservative. The thinking is that in order to get a nominee appointed to the bench, they must be somewhere near the middle of the road in order to gain the required number of Senate votes. This way of thinking exists with the full knowledge that some of the best years of the Court took place when liberal strengths were debating conservative strengths.

Something quite similar to this can, and does, happen in our churches. In an effort not to offend one another, we can become so complacent in our theological views that, regardless of where we began, we suddenly find ourselves driving down the middle of the road. As a result, we may reach a point where there is no longer a healthy exchange of ideas nor passion for our convictions, for it appears we all have the same views. The result is that we lose our ability to learn from one another, becoming a stagnant pool of similar viewpoints. Without opposition there is no debate; without debate there is no exchange of ideas; without the exchange of ideas there is no opportunity for learning; and without learning our spiritual growth is stalled. One day we awake to discover that travelling down the middle of the road has gotten us nowhere.

Our personal theological views may differ, but I believe it is good to be willing to at least listen to the views of another, for whenever we become so caught up in our own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others...not just the views of another, but also their needs. It is both possible and important to be strong in our convictions, and simultaneously receptive to the needs that exist on the other side of the road. While avoiding a middle-of-the-road theology, we must be willing to cross the road, lending an open ear and an open hand to those in need, regardless of any opposing views they may have. It is here, on the other side of the road, where spiritual growth will take place. The middle of the road is not the place where we want to sit up camp, but it is an important place, for it is here that we meet one another as brothers and sisters, embrace one another as children of God, respect each other for our created likeness to God, and if nothing else, agree to disagree and continue our journey.

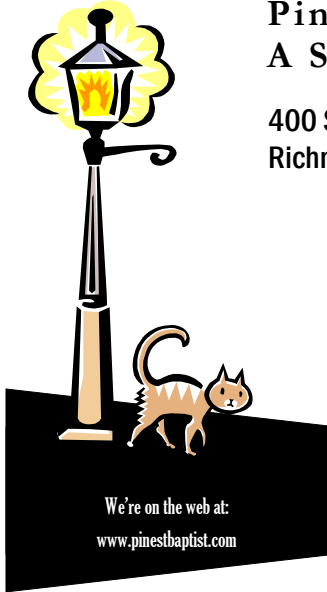
