#### Clint's Corner

A, B, C, D, or F?

It is not uncommon for someone to walk up to me and hand me something they want me to read. It might be a newspaper article, a report of some type, or even a book. I don't always read every word, or agree with every word, but I try to read enough to gain an understanding of what has been written. Not long ago I was



presented with a small book about what it means to be a church member. I was just about to return the book to its owner when I decided that the contents of the book read like a school report card, listing six classes for which we can reflect upon and assign ourselves a grade. So, consider these six areas of church membership, give yourself a grade for each, and ponder the results. And, if there was a "needs improvement" section, what would be written there?

- (1) I will be a functioning church member. The key word here is "functioning." Church members should be actively involved in the work and ministry of the church. How involved are you?
- (2) I will be a unifying church member. Church members are presently divided on many fronts, everything from socio-economic status to theology to politics. Jesus wanted us to be united in one body. Is your emphasis on uniting our congregation, or making divisions deeper and wider?
- (3) I will not let my church be about my preferences and desires. Our church consists of individuals, but our focus should not be on our own personal, self-centered desires, but on the common good of the church as a whole body.
- **(4) I will pray for my church leaders.** Ministers don't need prayer, right? After all, they are ministers. Sorry, but we ministers need all the prayer we can get. Are you including church leaders in your prayer time?
- (5) I will lead my family to be healthy church members. This implies that all church members have a leadership role, especially within their families. Are you a healthy church member yourself, and are you helping your family be a healthy church family?
- **(6)** I will treasure church membership as a gift. Church is a precious gift from the God who called us together as a steadfast fellowship of grace, brothers and sisters in Christ. Do you consider your church membership to be a treasured gift from God, something you hold near and dear, and is it revealed in your life?

So, what did your church membership report card look like? Did you get straight A's? I didn't. I have some work to do.




#### From the Oregon Hill Center
